Amazing Rice Cooker Cake -

Let's Make an Orange Cake with a Rice Cooker

Do you have a rice cooker? Do you have an orange? Why don't you make a delicious orange cake? That's right! If you have a rice cooker, you have the technology to make this tasty snack, and you will make new friends who will instantly eat it! Let's go!

• Here are the instructions (RECIPE):

- 1. Using kitchen paper, drain the yogurt for 5 minutes.
- 2. While you are waiting, peel the orange and grate the peel. Slice the orange.
- 3. Put the eggs, sugar, yoghurt and grated peel in a bowl and mix with a whisk.
- 4. Now add the pancake mix, lemon juice and melted butter. Mix again.
- 5. Use a little butter to grease the rice cooker pan. Coat the butter with a little sugar.
- 6. Now cover the pan with the orange slices, then put in the cake mix.
- 7. Cook using the standard rice cooking setting.

≪HINTS≫

- A. When cooking finishes, put a knife into the middle of the cake. The knife is clean when you take it out, the cake's ready. If not clean, cook a little longer.
- B. You can give the cake a stronger flavour by using the juice of 2 lemons.
- C. You might need to alter the cooking time depending on the size of rice cooker you are using.










You will need (MATERIALS):

- 1 large orange
- 100g yoghurt
- · 2 eggs
- 60g sugar
- 150g pancake mix
- · lemon juice (1 lemon)
- 50g melted butter
