## Vacation in Arles, Salute to van Gogh

This first golden week in Reiwa reminds me of the vacation in Arles in another GW more than 10 years ago. Arles is a city with a long history located in southern France. The reason I visited Arles was because of Vincent van Gogh. He had lived in Arles from 1888 ~ 1889, where he developed a new painting style and broadened his subject matter range with tremendous productivity of 187 paintings during his time there, including the masterpieces "Vincent's bedroom in Arles", "Starry night", "Cafe terrace at night" and "Self-portrait with bandaged ear", followed by a mental breakdown and the famous incident when van Gogh cut off his own ear. When I got to Arles, more than 200 years passed after van Gogh left. Many things have changed greatly, but some still remain unchanged, such as the air, the sunshine, the river Rhone, and Roman remnants. I walked around the town to see how this place gave van Gogh his marvelous inspiration and imagination.



When I arrived in Arles by TGV from Paris, it was a brightly sunny afternoon. The river Rhone ran across the city quietly beside us, real and modest. Van Gogh showed a strangling fantasy world of the river in his painting "The Starry Night over the Rhone". Through his eyes, the light and color were sensed in a completely different way from us due to the psychosis he was suffering from.
