My Favorite Local Destination

To the many students who have joined Aidai, but who are not from Ehime, I would like to introduce to you my favorite place, Mount Ishizuchi. With travel restrictions, now is the perfect time to explore locally. It is also great all year round! Summer, winter, autumn and spring, all offer a different side of nature to enjoy.

When I write this in spring, it is a great chance to approach Mount Ishizuchi from the Omogo Valley. There are many beautiful waterfalls and rock pools at the base, and as you elevate, there is a very special treat for your hard work. There are beautiful flowers here, that I have been told are called *akebono tsutsuji*, or in English a type of azalea. My pictures cannot do justice to the beauty of these flowers, please climb and see for yourself! I think it rivals cherry blossoms in its beauty.

Summer is very hot, and climbing the mountain from the bottom can be exhausting, so I recommend cheating with the ropeway. You can take a swift ride up, and then you only have a three hour hike to the summit! Amazing! The views are breathtaking, and because of the warm weather,



there is no ice in the more dangerous spots, like the climbing chains, or the nerve racking crossing of the stone ridge, to the highest point, Mount Tengu.

Autumn is your last chance to see the summit, before the heavy snow falls make it impossible for the average hiker like me. The stark difference of the top between Summer and Autumn is unbelievable. To look down from the summit, and see patches of vibrant red dotting the forests of Shikoku, while the skeletal frost covered branches reach up towards the peak in the early hours, is worth it.

The last and probably most underutilized time to visit Mount Ishizuchi is winter! There are websites that will advise when the road is clear of ice, and the ropeway itself drops you off above the snow line! All year round, please visit, but challenge me to a snowball fight if you see me there in winter!
